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12:50:03	Mark Thompson Brandt:	First, we provide evidence that “Building Reuse is Climate Action” and ask for more extensive funding and opportunities for deep green rehab of existing and historic buildings – large, medium and small. We need to educate federal policy-makers that 40% of carbon emissions relate to existing buildings and their operations, to help them understand the great returns on investment this funding will bring. Next, we ask for training programs (i.e. for pandemic-related unemployed) for jobs related to green rehab of historic buildings, often a labour-intensive activity with a lack of skilled persons available.
12:52:47	Laura Saimoto:	Yes, I agree, to feel the relevancy to our daily lives, heritage at the local level is key. Can we ask for a call to action for the federal commitment to partner with municipal local governments on standardized heritage tax credit legislation?

12:58:41	Nora Reid:	We need to persuade provincial governments to provide automatic property tax reductions to registered or designated heritage buildings (provided they are properly maintained and heritage features protected). Cannot leave it in municipal government hands as they very rarely will vote to lose property tax revenues.

13:03:42	N Oakley:	We might recall that in 2016 the federal government committed \$14.4 billion for infrastructure projects across Canada -- although \$9.9 billion was identified as needed to support the National Parks/Historic Sites system, only \$20 million of this was committed and spent primarily on roads and bridges. Not clear what was spent on conservation, collections management or even public interpretation. This is not demonstrating leadership in conservation on the part of Canada and echoing Don's words, is frankly "insulting"
